- Hud TV will send a meeting invite to those community members on the School Committee list for Public Comment.
- Hud TV will accept them into the Google Meet and mute their microphone.
- When the School Committee Chair recognizes someone wishing to make public comment, Hud TV will unmute that person's microphone and they will have two minutes to speak.
- When public comment is finished their microphone will be muted again by Hud TV.
- For persons wishing to make public comment in-person, the School Committee meeting is held at Hudson High School, Room F101.



I am pleased to provide information on the items below under the Report of the Superintendent for the regular School Committee meeting on December 12, 2023.

SEPAC Forum

On Tuesday, December 5, I had the pleasure of attending an open forum with parents sponsored by our Special Education Parent Advisory Council (SEPAC). About 20 parents were present along with our student services leadership Team (Kathy Kilcoyne, Tanya O'Connell, Alise Budny, and Matt Sanko). Parents used the opportunity to share concerns and ask questions. As this forum was not designed to address individual issues, those with concerns about their child are encouraged to reach out to their building principal, someone from student services or to me so that we can help provide a resolution.

Assabet Valley Collaborative (AVC)

The first School Committee update from Executive Director Cathy Cummins for the 2023-2024 school year can be found here. The document includes links to statutes and regulations governing educational collaboratives, DESE guidelines, our Collaborative Agreement, and a list of major priorities for AVC. This is provided for informational purposes only. A financial update from AVC will be shared in January.


EMS Committee


Our first Emergency Management Team meeting is scheduled for December 12, 2023. This team includes school leadership and representatives from police, fire, EMS, and transportation. Our agenda for December 12 includes a discussion about the addition of emergency response radios at each school that are a direct line to local police/fire/EMS dispatch. The group will also spend time this year updating the district's existing emergency management handbook.



School Bus Storage Update

As you know, the Town of Hudson is building a new facility for the Department of Public Works. The new facility will be developed on the same site where the DPW sits currently. Our school bus storage lot is located on the existing DPW property. The new DPW plan does not include space for bus storage. We have been working diligently since the summer trying to identify a new location for our bus fleet within Hudson with little success. If our transportation vendor needs to store buses outside of Hudson, there will be an increase in overall costs that could be as high as \$250K per year.

There is no town-owned property that is appropriate for bus storage. The only property under the care, custody, and control of the School Committee/School Department that may provide a solution is the Mulready School property. We have a significant amount of land behind Mulready that can potentially be developed into a gravel bus storage lot. We are currently working with the bus vendor to design a bus storage lot that uses space efficiently. Before a final decision is made, a proposal will be brought to the School Committee for approval. The image below shows the current bus lot and the impact to the Mulready site should we recreate the lot with the same dimensions on that property. If buses are stored behind Mulready, we want to minimize the impact on the fields behind the school used for recess and other school activities and ensure that there is a clear barrier between the bus lot and the fields for safety. We are in the early stages of this process and I will keep the committee informed as things move forward.



Professional Development - December 6

Students were released early on December 6 to allow time for educator professional development. The release time was used to provide a variety of training sessions on topics that included the new IEP at all levels, math curriculum at the elementary level, as well as time for ongoing building-based and department-specific initiatives. I had the pleasure of spending time observing a session for elementary ELL and Dual Language educators facilitated by our Language Acquisition Coach, Carlene Ryan. This session was designed so that educators could walk away with new instructional strategies ready to try in their classrooms the very next day. Research has consistently shown that this kind of job-embedded professional development is the most effective and impactful both in terms of professional practice and overall impact on student learning. Carlene's PD session was one in a series of sessions focusing on an instructional approach developed by Project GLAD (Guided Language Acquisition Design). GLAD strategies are research-based and require teachers to deliver academic content, especially to language learners, through an integrated, balanced literacy approach.

Optional Chromebook Insurance for Families

Dell has recently changed their accidental coverage policy that protects the Chromebooks we distribute to students. These changes place more of an onus on families for accidental damage. In response to this, Ellen Schuck has researched a variety of third-party vendors that have the ability to provide families with additional protection at a low cost to them. Securranty, a third

party insurance provider, has put together a program for Hudson that would allow families to purchase accidental coverage one year at a time for \$27 per year. This additional coverage would not be required, but offered as an option for families to protect them from potential out-of-pocket costs for accidental damage that is no longer covered by Dell. Interested families would enroll directly with Securranty.

Enrollment

I have included an enrollment report for December in the School Committee packet. Once again, this report shows no significant changes to enrollment across all schools. K-12 enrollment has increased from 2,309 students on November 8 to 2,316 on December 6 - a total increase of 7 students or 0.3%. The tables below provide a month-to-month enrollment comparison by school and grade.
































































District Comparisons - Grades 3-8 ELA






District Comparisons - Grades 3-8 Math





RE: Maximum Balance - SEPAC Revolving Account

I am requesting the Hudson School Committee approve an increase to the maximum established balance of the existing revolving account for the Special Education Parent Advisory Council (SEPAC). This maximum allowable balance for this account is currently \$3,000. I am requesting that this amount be increased to \$7,000 which will allow the School Department to accept funds raised in the amount of \$5,500 for extra-curricular programming supporting students with disabilities currently being held by the Quinn Middle School Home and School Association. Once transferred to the SEPAC revolving account, the funds will be used to support a Unified Track and Field Program.


